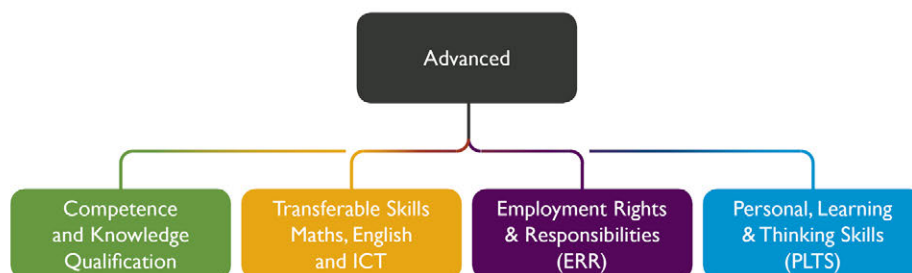

Level 3 Diploma in Playwork

There are no specific entry requirements other than meeting the Apprenticeship eligibility conditions.

Group A - mandatory units
